## THE HISTORY OF CATHOLIC CHARITIES IN BROOKLYN AND QUEENS

Throughout the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, the programs and services of Catholic Charities have stood as pillars of compassion and support for 125 years. Its rich history is a testament to the enduring commitment to serve those in need, as caring staff members live out the mission of “affirming the dignity and value of every person, especially the most vulnerable members of our diverse society.”

The roots of Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens trace back to the late 19th century, a time of

rapid immigration and urbanization in New York City. At that time, concerned Catholics came together to meet the needs of children orphaned in downtown Brooklyn by poverty and disease. As other needs arose, they sought ways to meet the need for food, clothing, education and housing. By the end of the 19th century, the services being provided were so diverse and widespread that they required formal organization. In 1899, Bishop McDonald of Brooklyn appointed Monsignor William White to bring together all the diocesan charitable agencies into one organization and, officially, Catholic Charities was born.

### Growth and Evolution

From its modest beginnings, Catholic Charities quickly expanded its services to meet the changing needs of the community. By the early 20th century, it had established a network of outreach programs, including programs for families, food pantries, and educational initiatives. During times of economic hardship, such as the Great Depression, Catholic Charities played a pivotal role in offering relief and support to families facing dire circumstances.

Combatting poverty has remained a primary focus for the past 125





years. In 1964, Bishop Joseph M. Sullivan, former Executive Director and President of the Catholic Charities Board of Trustees, said: "The most urgent concern of our country is the crime of poverty, a national disgrace in the wealthiest country in the history of man. The challenge of poverty is a catholic challenge because it is a challenge to all men. Catholic Charities must be in the front lines of this most just of all wars."

Today, Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens continues to combat the effects of poverty while also offering a diverse range of services aimed at empowering individuals

and families. These include mental health clinics, affordable housing, older adult programs, early childhood centers, youth and job training initiatives, and a wealth of community outreach services. The agency's programs address immediate needs while also fostering long-term stability and self-sufficiency.

### Looking Forward

As Catholic Charities looks to the future, it remains steadfast in its mission to uphold the dignity of every individual and address the root causes of poverty and injustice. As one of the largest multi-service

agencies in the nation, Catholic Charities continues the work that guided its formation 125 years ago: to meet the needs of its neighbors with compassion and solidarity. From its humble beginnings to its expansive array of 160+ programs and services today, Catholic Charities has touched the lives of countless individuals and families, offering hope, support, and opportunity. As it embarks on its next chapter, Catholic Charities remains a beacon of hope and a model of compassionate service for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. ■



# Then & Now

HOW IT STARTED; HOW IT'S GOING



**Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens has provided essential community services for over 125 years. It all started in 1899 when a group of concerned Catholics came together to help children orphaned by poverty and disease in Brooklyn. From those humble beginnings, the agency has blossomed, now supporting more than 500,000 people in need each year.**

*THEN: In 1899, the year Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens was founded, there were 1.3 million residents in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.*

**NOW:** Catholic Charities, a force for good, is proud to serve over 5.1 million neighbors with a network of 160+

programs throughout both boroughs, a testament to our unwavering commitment to the community.

*THEN: Catholic Charities, a pillar of strength, served the poor through the Great Depression and the First and Second World Wars by providing child and family welfare services, social activities, protective care, and health services, demonstrating our resilience in the face of adversity.*

**NOW:** Catholic Charities provides more than \$7 million in food assistance annually to families, children, the homebound elderly, and older adults through our network of 60 parish-based food pantries and pop-up food distributions. For those in need of emergency services, we serve more than 4,000 clients annually at our walk-in centers and respond to over 45,000 calls for assistance through our Call Center.

*THEN: In 1969, an Aging Services Office was created, focusing on the concerns of the elderly. By the 1970s, Golden Age Clubs were established in parishes throughout the Diocese, the precursors to today's Older Adult Centers.*

**NOW:** More than 16,800 clients ages 65 and over are served each year through our Older Adult Services programs, and more than 650,000 meals are delivered annually through our Home Delivered Meals Program to homebound seniors.

*THEN: In 1975, Catholic Charities Progress of Peoples Development Corporation began transforming vacant land and buildings into affordable housing units and transforming the lives of individuals and families.*

**NOW:** More than 4,567 units have been created with supportive services for seniors, families, the formerly



homeless, those with HIV, and those struggling with mental illness.

*THEN: In 1975, the agency took over five mental health clinics previously operated by Catholic Medical Center.*

**NOW:** Catholic Charities serves more than 7,700 clients annually through our network of neighborhood clinics and recovery programs.

*THEN: Catholic Charities' roots lay in caring for children, and by 1965, Catholic Charities had opened its first Head Start program at St. Joseph Hall, a girls' home in Bedford-Stuyvesant.*

**NOW:** More than 1,800 children each year are nurtured from birth to age five and provided with more than 467,000 meals at our network of Early Childhood Centers and Family Child Care Programs.

*THEN: A 1926 survey within Catholic Charities determined that resources for family welfare needed to be of primary importance to the agency.*

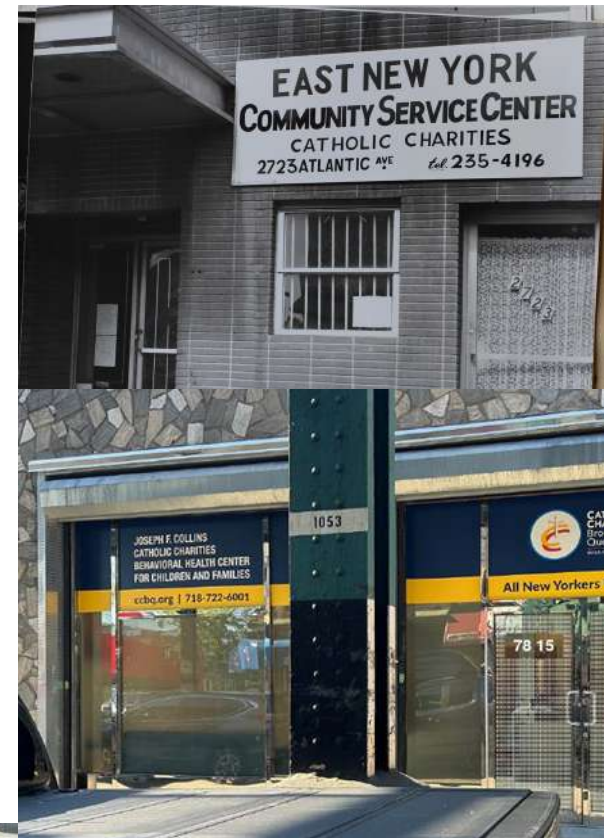
**NOW:** Our Family Services programs provide 23,200 people annually with a wide range of services for the entire family, from homelessness prevention and summer youth employment programs to literacy initiatives and WIC services for pregnant and new mothers.

*THEN: In the late 1800s, a flood of more than 2 million immigrants arrived in New York City, all of them needing housing, jobs, and food.*

**NOW:** Catholic Charities exemplifies compassion for those seeking refuge in the United States, offering limited financial assistance, emergency food and food pantry access, hot meals, clothing, diapers, English as a Second Language classes, WIC programs, and workforce development.

Throughout the years, Catholic Charities has been unwavering in its dedication to meeting the community's diverse needs. Today, 125 years after its founding, Catholic Charities is dedicated to keeping alive a tradition of community outreach, advocacy, and

social justice that is a hallmark of our continuing mission to the neediest among us. ■







# AS IT MARKS 125 YEARS, CCBQ LOOKS TO STEP UP MENTAL HEALTH OUTREACH

**Msgr. John Bracken likes to describe himself as a cheerleader for Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens and said he is always eager to speak about the wide range of programs it offers to people in need. This year, as the agency marks its 125th anniversary, his efforts to promote the nonprofit organization have been kicked up a notch.**

Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens, which was founded in 1899, is planning a number of events to celebrate the 125th anniversary, including a gala dinner in the fall. But the organization is also determined to use the anniversary year to spread public awareness of the programs it offers.

As part of that effort, CCBQ has launched a new mental health initiative. And that's where Msgr. Bracken comes in.

Msgr. Bracken, director of patrimony for the Diocese of Brooklyn, is the

chairman of CCBQ's anniversary committee and is helping to launch the new mental health initiative. Msgr. Bracken said he will be reaching out to pastors around the diocese to let them know that CCBQ stands ready, willing, and able to provide mental health services for their parishioners.

"I see what I'm doing as being a cheerleader for Catholic Charities and making the pastors, parish priests, and others who are involved in local parish work aware of the many opportunities that they have to reach out and get the professional help, advice, and counsel their parishioners need — especially in



the areas of mental health, seniors, and drug addiction,” he explained.

As part of the initiative, Catholic Charities has posted a Mental Well-Being video series on its website, [www.ccbq.org](http://www.ccbq.org), explaining the signs to look out for in someone in distress, and ways to help.

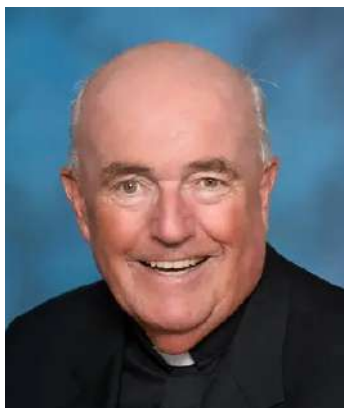
One of the videos focuses on mental well-being for children and features Program Director Zory Wentt explaining how to help kids.

Catholic Charities operates five behavioral health clinics in Brooklyn and Queens (Corona, Flatbush, Glendale, Jamaica, and Rockaway) where children and adults can find help. The clinics provide counseling, substance abuse recovery programs, and other forms of assistance.

Albert G. said he has been coming to the Corona Behavioral Health Clinic for the past few years for group therapy to help him deal with borderline personality disorder. He started visiting during the pandemic. “During the quarantine, I wasn’t doing anything. I had been in a program before that and it was over Zoom. But I needed something in person and it didn’t seem like there was anything in person,” he said. “I was pretty much on my own at home. My symptoms were getting worse. I wasn’t really taking care of my mental state as much as I should have,” he added.

Albert, who was raised Catholic but said he is not a regular churchgoer, heard about Catholic Charities and started attending therapy sessions at the Corona clinic. He feels the sessions have greatly benefited him. “They have a welcoming staff. But it’s also all my peers here. I need to be around peers who are dealing with the same issues as me,” he explained.

In addition to the therapy sessions, Albert said he appreciates the sense of structure Catholic Charities has brought to his life. He works with an individual case manager who meets with him

regularly to set goals and discuss his progress. “Here and there, I’ve had doubts about myself. But I’ve stuck with it,” he added.

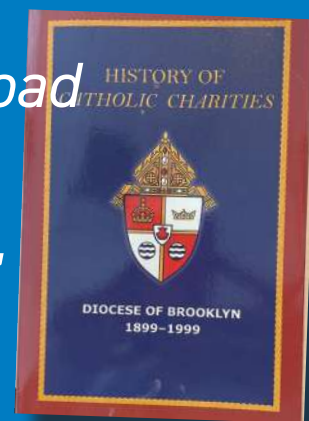
According to the National Institute of Mental Health, an estimated 20% of adults are dealing with some type of mental health issue, the most common of which is depression. According to Mental Health America, an estimated 21 million adults in the U.S. are affected by major depression each year.

Catholic Charities is filling an important need, Msgr. Bracken said. “Looking at these issues with young people, some of the statistics about them, like suicide rates, today. Then there’s also big addiction issues. And there’s also senior citizens’ loneliness. We live in the largest city in the world and we have people feeling isolated,” he said.

Even with all its services, Catholic Charities Brooklyn and Queens is always looking to do more, Msgr. Bracken said. “How do we touch those people and how can a parish be able to be much more supportive than they already are?” he added. ■
